



MM Readers' ASK: Cecil May RESPONDS

Response: The three keys to unlocking a puzzling passage are context, context, and context. The

QUESTION:

In the sermon of the Mount, Jesus said, "Judge not" (Matthew 7:1). But later He said, "Judge righteous judgment" (John 7:24). Explain, please.

He created them." So God created males as males and females as

context of Matthew 7:1-3 suggests a negative connotation for "judge." "Judge not, that you be not judged. For with what judgment you pronounce, you will be judged; and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye?" There are two kinds of judgment that we are not qualified to make, because we

cannot read hearts: judging motives and pronouncing final judgment into heaven or hell.

In John 7, the emphasis is on specific conduct. Scripture says some things are good and some things are evil. We are obligated to call evil evil. When we call abortion murder of a being made in the image of God, we are echoing scripture. When we call homosexual relations sinful and a shame, we are citing scripture.

Genesis 1:27 says, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female

females. A man cannot just decide to be a woman and it be so. A woman cannot decide to be a man and it be so. I have humorously asked, "I am 90 years old; can I just decide to be 40 and it be so?"

I have been asked, "if a person has decided to be baptized and dies on his way to the baptistry, will he go to heaven?"That is one of the kinds of judgment we are not qualified to make. The Bible says the judge of all the earth will do right. He knows hearts and we do not (Genesis 18:25).

God will make the right judgment, and we can be confident of that. Almost everyone believes that there is some point at which salvation occurs. It is possible for a person to die right before that point, whether it is "say the sinner's prayer," or "be baptized." God is qualified to make that judgment, and we are not. Scripture plainly teaches that at baptism our sins are washed away (Acts 22:16). You or I are not authorized to make exceptions to that rule, but God is sovereign and can do as He wills. We are assured that He will make the right choice. MM

A Friend and Colleague Worthy of Honor

I don't think I have ever enjoyed a cup of coffee more than when I was sharing a conversation with Cecil R. May, Jr. In 1959, my family moved to Ripley, Mississippi, to work with the Beech Hill Church of Christ. I soon met Cecil R. May, Jr., the minister of the Ripley Church of Christ. I found Cecil to be a quiet man who listened more than he talked. However, when he did talk, his words were of value and went right to the heart of the question, need, or problem at hand. Whether speaking from a pulpit or in a classroom, writing in a periodical or in a

book, or visiting over a cup of coffee, what Cecil said made us more familiar with the Bible

and wiser for life.

Over the years, our relationship with Cecil, Winnie, and their family grew strong, especially during their years in Vicksburg and our many years in greater Jackson, MS. We shared much in discussions and conversations about the Bible and in our service to God. Cecil once honored me from the pulpit saying that he and I shared a rare "oneness" as friends and coworkers. He was not saying we agreed on everything. He was eflecting on the fact that he does not reject all who don't see eyeto-eye with him; that he shares a "oneness" in Christ with those truly seeking to know and understand the Word of God, being fully convinced in their own mind, and acting in good faith—even if he disagrees with some of their conclusions—truly a "Gentleman and Scholar." Cecil always states his beliefs boldly, clearly, with strong evidence, and with courtesy and openness of mind. He expects the same from others.

In 1979, as I was serving as academic dean of Magnolia Bible College, the college needed a replacement of our president who had moved on to other fields of labor. The college board asked me to fill the role. I loved studying and teaching too much to spend a major part of my time in public relations and fund raising. I suggested that they seek the services of Cecil R. May, Jr. I reminded them he was a good scholar, faithful to the Bible, and was known

and highly respected in Mississippi and the area served by MBC. However, he informed them that he was already under contract as dean of International Bible College (now Heritage Christian University). I proposed that if he would agree to come after he fulfilled his contract, I would serve in the interim. He agreed to come, and he served as president with distinction for seventeen years--traveled extensively, labored tirelessly, preached faithfully, taught with great knowledge and insights. He was loved by students, teachers, supporters, and churches. Although I left MBC to teach at

> Harding, a larger and better-known university, never has there been another colleague whom I have held in

higher esteem than Cecil R. May, Jr.

After he retired from MBC, he served as the dean of the V. P. Black College of Biblical Studies for 15 years through

May 2013. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree (BA) in biblical languages from Harding University, a Master of Arts degree (MA) and a Master of Divinity degree (MDiv) from Harding University Graduate School of Theology. As a preacher, writer, and educator, Cecil earned the honor of being awarded an honorary LLD from Freed-Hardeman Universitv. He served with distinction as Bible teacher at Columbia Christian College, president and professor at Magnolia Bible College, and Dean of Heritage Christian University. He has spent most of his ninety years as a much sought-after gospel preacher--as local minister, elder, and evangelist.

Cecil has spent years as the editor of Preacher Talk, and writer of the monthly back page column "Finally Brethren" for The Gospel Advocate.

For about forty years, he has written the "Bible Questions Answered" column in the Magnolia Messenger. Cecil's column answering questions from readers contributed greatly to making the Messenger the success it is. His well-known books are Bible Questions and Answers, published by Faulkner University's Pillar Press, and *Providence: The Silent Sovereignty of God*, published by the Gospel Advocate in 2014.

Cecil's good family of Christian servants are a convincing witness to his Christian character. Winnie was a faithful coworker



The above title was the theme of this year's *Back to the Bible Campaign* conducted by the Cox Blvd. church of Christ in Sheffield, AL. This year's campaign focused on the area near the Cox Blvd. church building. In addition to members of the Cox Blvd. church, there were about 15 campaigners from Pennsylvania, Oklahoma, Texas, and Tennessee who participated. Likewise, three congregations from nearby Athens and Cherokee, AL were represented. More than 1,600 doors were knocked during the three-day campaign.

With an upward, inward, and outward view, we are now poised to move Forward to accomplish great things in the future for the sake of God's kingdom.

In keeping with the theme, the campaign was launched during the Wednesday night devotional with an *Upward* appeal that God would bless the effort. After all, we are asked to plant and water, and God will give the increase (cf. 1 Cor. 3:6). God, indeed, blessed the effort with six baptisms and one restoration. The angels and brethren rejoiced for those whose eternal destiny was changed during the campaign.

Not only was there an upward appeal to God, but there was also an *Inward* emphasis. Many service projects on behalf of Cox Blvd. members were included. These service projects especially focused on widows, widowers, the invalid, and those with longterm health issues. Such things as house repairs, cleaning houses (bathrooms, vacuuming, washing windows, etc.), yard work (mowing, trimming shrubs, mulching, painting, cleaning gutters, pressure washing, etc.), delivering lunch to elderly members, visiting all our shut-ins at least twice, taking food to families in need in our community were all a part of the campaign effort. Preschool and elementary-aged children baked cookies and delivered them to our shut-ins. One afternoon during the campaign, under the guidance of their parents, they were involved in door-knocking. Our teenagers also heavily participated in every aspect of the campaign. Truly, as we turned our attention inward, the bond that binds us together in Christ was greatly strengthened.

Always an integral part of every campaign is the focus on

studying the Bible with non-Christians. This was the *Outward* emphasis of the campaign. There was a total of 78 studies set and 28 of them were taught the plan of salvation. Additionally, 39 studies were left for possible future studies. In the Old Testament when Israel was on the verge of defeat, four leprous men ventured out of the famished city to throw themselves on the mercy of the Syrians who were their mortal enemies. When they arrived in the camp, they found it empty because God had made the Syrians hear a large host of chariots, horses and men coming against them. They feared the Israelites and their allies were coming against them with a huge force; thus, they all hastily fled to safety. When the lepers arrived at the empty camp and began to collect for themselves the spoils the Syrians left behind, they exclaimed, "We are not doing right. This day is a day of good news" (2 Kgs. 7:9). If we withhold the good news of the gospel from others, we aren't doing right either. The campaign was an attempt to reach as many as possible with the saving message of Christ. Only God knows what the future results will be or how long in the future the seed of God's word will have its impact.

With an upward, inward, and outward view, we are now poised to move *Forward* to accomplish greater things in the future for the sake of God's kingdom. **MM**

in Memory

The recent funeral for Harold Hazelip (1930-2022) was modest indeed when compared to others who have lived long and accomplished much. In my judgment, however, his wife, Helen, did a good thing in stipulating that his funeral be about him as "a Christian man," not about his preaching, academic career, and television work with Herald of Truth. She knew more than any that Harold's Christian deportment underlay all that he did. Consequently, only one person was permitted to give personal reflections during the funeral. The balance of the memorial consisted of singing hymns, prayer, and hearing Scripture read, chiefly by his grandsons.

Harold was born in Asphalt, KY, a small unincorporated community located a few miles west of the Mammoth Cave National Park. There he became a Christian (1944) and preached his first few sermons (1947). He studied at Freed-Hardeman College and David Lipscomb College (B.A.). While preaching in Louisville, KY, he earned his B.D. from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. His Ph.D. was earned at the University of Iowa (1967).

His Preaching and Teaching

After Harold moved to Memphis to teach at Harding University's Graduate School of Religion, he soon began a twenty-year peaching ministry at the Highland Street church in that city.

He served as Dean at Harding during his last fourteen years in Memphis. In 1986 he moved to Nashville to serve as Lipscomb's President (1986-97).

At Harding his relationships with faculty and students was always pleasant. He was efficient in administration and gacious in judgment. His Harding students appreciated his thorough preparation and substantive lectures. Lipscomb appreciated his presidential leadership of the University as it grew in enrollment and academics.

Although he made contributions in academics, Harold always preached. He cared about the local church and the proclamation of the Word. His doctoral dissertation in-

volved a study of Stephen Marshall's preaching during the British Long Parlaiment (1640-1660). His sermons were well prepared and delivered in a calm, "extended conversation" style. That mode of delivery was both taught and exemplified by Batsell Barrett Baxter, Harold's teacher, friend, and eventually colleague in work on the Herald of Truth television program. Many of his sermons

may still be heard on the Highland (Memphis) church's website.

I knew Harold to be thoughtfully and theologically conservative. Although serious about his convictions, Harold nevertheless avoided conflict as much as possible. In his early year, he engaged in at least three public debates (Preacher of Today, II:189), but I know of none after that. He once told me that he shunned disputation and disliked conflict, "a trait I likely got from my mother," he added. He would deal with issues as needed, always with measured words; but he avoided wrangling and disputation.

The Man

It is important to know oneself, one's strengths and weaknesses. Harold once commented to me, "If I had lived during the Old Testament period, I would have been a priest rather than a prophet." I could not see Harold as an Elijah, a Jeremiah or a Jonah, and certainly not a John the Baptist. Rather, he preferred to take existing entities and improve on them, to do them well. God uses all kinds of servants, doesn't he?


All who knew Harold well appreciated his genuineness. He was not one to engage in pretense. I always found him to be fair in judgments, calm in discussions, and Christian in spirit. While a good conversationalist, he kept much to himself. He cared deeply about his family, "Helen and the boys", as he referred to them often

> I admired Harold's attention to his "temple of the Holy Spirit" (1 Cor. 6:19-20). I never knew him to play on any kind of athletic team, or to golf or jog. Rather, he engaged in exercises developed for the Royal Canadian Air Force since he could do them at home and thus avoid the time and money involved outside sports.

Harold had a sense of humor. He would laugh at a good joke. Once at coffee break at Harding in Memphis, the conversation involved the question whether

Minister's Challenge



Research Insights

We hear the "war stories" of those who were hurt in ministry, and it destroyed their children's faith in the church. Those stories are painful, and if it is yours we hurt with you. But that is not the norm. In

THE BLESSING OF A GREAT RELATIONSHIP

A young couple came into my office to talk with me about a marital problem. They had been married about three years. They were somewhat dissatisfied in their marriage. She had a terrible temper and seemed to get upset about everything that happened. They had fallen into the pattern of not talking about their problems, because she would get mad and vent her anger toward him. They wanted help.

She had come from what some call an "abusive" family. Her

father was an alcoholic, and in anger he would beat the children. She could remember all the times she had tried to please her father, only to be told she was "no good." She never knew what to expect from him, what would set off the fireworks. She never knew when or where the explosion would come. It created in her fear and hatred for her father.

The Bible says, "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18). The reverse is true also. Fear has the capacity to drive out love. She hated her father, but still served him in his bitter old age. She had never faced the hatred she felt toward him, and it was affecting her whole life.

When I began to describe to her from Scripture what a Christian father was like--a servant/leader,

expresses his love for his wife and children, listens to their needs, understanding, supports the family (Ephesians 5; 1 Peter 3:7; 1 Corinthians 11) she said, "My father was not anything like that." She could not relate to that kind of father. Her experience with an earthly father had been one of abuse. It was not anything like what Scripture says it should be. She is not alone in that experience.

Our family background does affect how we relate to our present family and to God as our Father. I am not saying we can't change our attitudes and overcome our past. But it is hard to do, and unless a person really wants to do it, it will not get done. Her

past was causing her to lose her future with her husband and her family. If she did not change and deal with her feelings toward her father, all would be lost.

We all want richer marriages! The key is to share genuine acceptance and approval of each other. One of the best sources, beside Scripture, I have found to help us see how to enrich our families is a workbook by Gary Smalley, entitled "The Blessing." He describes a five-step plan for us to use in giving each other in the family what he calls "The Blessing." He describes "The Bless-


> ing" as "words and actions that provide an indelible picture of affirmation in a person's mind and memory." It is giving to another your honor, your praise, and your love. It can empower our relationships to succeed and last a lifetime.

> The idea of giving a "blessing" comes from examples in Scripture. God is described as blessing man. "So, God created man in His own image; in the image of God, He created him; male and female He created them. Then God blessed them..." (Genesis 1:27, 28). "So, God blessed Noah and his sons..." (Genesis 9:1). "I will make you a great nation; I will bless you and make your name great; And you shall be a blessing" (Genesis 12:2). "After the death of Abraham, God blessed his son Isaac" (Genesis 25:11). God still blesses people today. He has

"blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ" (Ephesians 1:3).

It is crucial that we practice a similar "Blessing" in our families. A daily assurance of worth and acceptance of our children, spouse, family, and friends.

A blessing is powerful and can benefit those who give it and receive it. It does not have to be a big production. It can be as simple as listening when others talk, or letting your child spend the day with you at work, or admitting your mistakes, or leaving a "love note" with some cookies, or a hundred other ways of saying, "You

are special; I love you; I care!"

Parents can bless their children, spouses can bless each other, friends can bless other friends, children can bless their parents, church workers can bless other members. It only takes the knowledge of HOW to do it, and the DESIRE and COMMITMENT to express your LOVE and CARE. Here are the five steps:

■ MEANINGFUL TOUCH

Researchers describe meaningful touch as a gentle touch, stroke, kiss, or hug given by significant people in our lives. Touch becomes meaningful when the one touching desires to bless the one touched and reaches out for his or her benefit, not their own.

Meaningful touch is appropriate touching. You can hug your own children, but not every child in Sunday School class. In our society with abuse, particularly sexual abuse, we need to limit touch to what is appropriate.

Before even a word is spoken, the blessing is conveyed by touch. One five-year-old told her mother she loved the way Janice tousled the top of her head when she walked by. "It makes me feel special" she said.

Touch carries the symbolism of giving a blessing. A young woman holding hands with a boyfriend means "I am taken. Do not ask me for a date."Two businesspeople shaking hands means "Welcome, I am glad you're here." A father with his hand resting on his son's shoulder in front of a broken window means "It is ok, we can get it fixed. I love you!"

Above all, touch symbolizes acceptance. In Mark 1:40-41 is the story of Jesus healing a leper. The leper came to Him begging him on his knees to heal him. "Jesus, moved with compassion, put out His hand and touched him, and said to him, I am willing; be cleansed." First, Jesus had compassion on him. Second, He touched him. That touch must have meant more to the leper than anything anyone had ever done. Why? Because it meant acceptance!

■ SPOKEN WORDS

Touch, however important, can't carry the whole load. A verbal message of acceptance, appreciation, or encouragement is needed to give the blessing. Our words also have an effect. They may not always do what we intend, but they're mighty in affecting the lives of those to whom we speak.

Positive words bless; negative words demolish. Silence can destroy someone who looks to us for a blessing. Both people and relationships suffer in the absence of spoken words of love, encouragement, and support--words of blessing.

EXPRESSING HIGH VALUE

To be affective, our words and actions must express our esteem for the one we are blessing and affirm that this person is valuable. It is important to place value on the person not for what they do, but for who they are. I value my daughter because she is my daughter! I value my wife because she is my wife. Not because of what they have done.

We can say or do a wide variety of things to attach high value

to another person. We can write a note and put it in a lunch box that says, "You are tops!" We approve of them just because they are here. Our presence is a great way to show we attach high value to them.

PICTURING A SPECIAL FUTURE

Well-meaning, but ill-informed, parents try to motivate their children with negative statements. Too many children hear, "You will never amount to anything," or "Hey, dummy, what went wrong this time?"

We can give those we bless a sense of security and confidence by conveying that the gifts and character traits they have right now are attributes that God can bless and use in the future.

The positive/negative message about one's future can be given without words, as in the case of Mike and Doug. Mike had marked musical talent and had made all-state choir. On the afternoon of Mike's performance of the year, his brother Doug had a soccer practice. Not a game, or a play-off, or a championship game, just a routine practice. Mike's dad, who had been a pro athlete, chose to go to the soccer game rather than the choir presentation. His decision told Mike, "What you are interested in, what you want to be, the talent you have, who you are is not important to me." Mike struggled all his life to feel accepted by others because of this incident and many more that, music was not as important as sports. He could never feel that what he accomplished had any merit.

■ AN ACTIVE COMMITMENT

This element is tough. It requires sticking with the program even when your child misbehaves or the person you are blessing disappoints you, and you are ready to throw up your hands in despair. It is committing time and energy to involvement in that person's life to see that the words of blessing you speak come to pass.

A commitment to carry out the blessing is essential. Everyone intent on giving the blessing needs to rely on the Lord to give them strength and staying power to confirm their children or spouse's blessing. We must commit our lives to their best interests. Express to them by hugs and kisses and words that they are im-

Finally, we must become a student of the ones we wish to bless. We must be persistent in our communication. Often, we give up too soon, particularly if we have struggled in our relationship with our children. Shared activities with others we want to bless gives us an opportunity to know them better. We find out what they like and dislike. We ask questions to get to know them. We may think we know their thinking, dreams, interests, and goals. But keeping up with changes requires constant attention.

Commitment is costly, but the rewards are worth the price. It takes demanding work, time, courage, wisdom, boldness, and creativity. But the result is a great relationship that keeps on getting better every day. MM

We don't always see the value of what is in our hands until we give it to God. The house I inherited from my parents 29 years ago is now serving students as a Christian Student Center for Mississippi Delta Community College in Moorhead, MS. Now that you know the end of the story, let me invite you to read and see God's hand from as far back as I can go to unfold the events.

As a little girl growing up in a very small MS Delta town, I was a dedicated church goer with good loving parents, T. G. And Mary Downer. They gave me a happy and secure home. I was told there were starving children in Africa, and I should eat all the food on my plate. I felt so sorry for these children that every Sunday I would come home and stand in front of a mirror and give the lesson the preacher had preached. I did this thinking that

one day I could go to Africa and teach them how to get to Heaven. God saw my heart. Time passed, I became a teenager and started dating a wonderful guy, Gene Paul Gibson. He was a member of the church of Christ. Most of our dates ended in a Bible study. After much studying, stubbornness, tears and praying, I left the church I was raised in and was baptized. My family felt like I had

left them too, but I didn't.

Gene and I began our lives together raising three children and always taking every opportunity to teach my parents. Years later my parents began attending services with us, but not until they

got tired of us taking their grandchildren and leaving them alone to go to worship. We never put family before God. They saw that and grew to respect our commitment to God. After sixteen years of praying and teaching, both of my parents were baptized in

their seventies. My mother first and two years later at age 79, my daddy was baptized. He only lived three years after his baptism. He wanted me to come back to the baptistry when he was baptized, and I did. My six-foot, dripping-wet daddy grabbed me by the shoulders looking me straight in the eyes and said, "I have wasted most of my life, but what I have left I want to give back to God". Those words penetrated my heart and never left.

Mother lived eleven years after daddy died. I talked with her about leaving me the land and house in Moorhead, which is located directly across from the college, and giving my sister the lot in Florida. My Mother said, "Madolyn, this old house is not worth

anything." I replied, "True, but let's give it to God and see what can happen." Honestly, I didn't know at that time what I would do with a seventy-five-year-old wooden frame house. My daddy's words were always with me. I just wanted to take what my parents had worked for and left to me as an inheritance and give it back to God. I had grown up in a little Mississippi delta town and realized if I had not met my late husband, I might have never heard the pure gospel that changed not only mine but my parent's eternal lives. I wanted the church to exist in my hometown so others could be taught.

Standing at the door, looking across the street at the campus, I saw the countless young souls that I wanted to reach with the Gospel. In 1995, Gene and I opened the student center. My parents never saw that what they left behind was used to teach thousands of students. Some are preaching today. One is a nurse. Lives have been changed all because of the hearts that wanted to give back to God what they had in their hands. He sees and blesses far beyond our dreams and expectations. I never went to Africa to teach, but 80% of the college is African American. Gene died in 2019. God blessed me and the student center with Eddie Lewis when we married December 18. 2020.

REMEMBERING MY DAD

This summer Madolyn and I began a journey to Oregon to discover the story around the airplane crash that took my dad's life on May 3, 1949. I was almost three years old at the time. My dad had served in WWII as an Army Engineer in North Africa. He and the rest of his troop fought the German forces all the way to Berlin. He earned the rank of First Lieutenant.

After the war ended, my family moved to Tacoma, Washington, where I was born. Dad was stationed at Fort Lewis. I always used to say that I was such a beautiful baby they named the fort after me, but I think that was another Lewis. We moved to Oklahoma where my younger brother was born, but then moved back to Tacoma.


Dad was killed in a terrible accident as his troop did maneuvers on the Columbia River. Madolyn and I went to

The Dalles, Oregon, to get the facts about what really happened and see the place my family had heard about for years but had never seen.

The Columbia River gorge is a beautiful place. Mt. Hood dominates the horizon. In the 1950s, the Army Engineers built several locks and dams along the river to promote commerce, and it changed the appearance of the river from the day when the Wasco Native Americans fished the Celilo Falls for salmon. That's an interesting story itself.

Madolyn and I began our adventure at The Dalles library. The local paper did not have copies of newspapers from that time, so we had to go to the library to look at their microfiche copies of

the papers. The Dalles had two papers, "The Dalles Chronicle" and "The Dalles Optimist." The Chronicle was a daily paper, and the Optimist was a weekly. The library staff became involved in our search. One lady, who had retired earlier that year, came to our rescue, and helped us print out the newspaper articles we found. We thanked them for their help and suggestions.

The articles told us that the crash had happened at Celilo Falls on May 3, 1949. The plane, an L-16, was caught in a down draft and crashed into a native American's truck parked by the falls. The area was close to the "Five Mile Marker" on the canal, that allowed boats to go around

the falls, and at the place on Highway 30 called "Dead Man's Curve." The information seemed clear so we should have been able to find the spot, but the river had changed in appearance because of the dams. The river was now called Celilo Lake.

To get information about "Five Mile Marker" on the canal and "Dead Man's Curve" on Highway 30,

we thought we could go to a nursing home and maybe some of the old timers might remember these places. We didn't have much luck except for an old railroad engineer who remembered that Celilo Falls was close to Celilo Park next to the Native American Reservation at Celilo. So, we headed to Celilo Park.

Celilo Falls was a tribal fishing area for centuries. The Native American tribes would spear huge salmon while standing on the rocks. They built platforms over the rushing waters from which they gathered fish in long-handled nets. These fishing grounds and the right to take fish from the Columbia River were reserved in 1855 treaties between the tribes and the United States Government. The dams that were completed in 1957 filled the

river basin and covered the falls, ending the fishing grounds. The government then placed the Native Americans in a reservation at Celilo.

We went to Celilo Park and viewed the area. It's on the banks of the Columbia River. We went to the reservation to talk to any of the native Americans we might see. One man talked to us about the location of the falls. He said it was in between the white buoys in the river near the park. So, we learned the spot where the crash likely took place. We went back to the park to view the area again with the new information.

It was a little emotional for me to see the spot where the crash happened. To see the river and the land and to know that dad died in a beautiful place for some reason brought comfort to me. I really don't remember my dad because I was so young when he died. I'm sure he loved me and held me and cared for me as a good father would, but I don't remember those things. It was good for me to feel his presence there and to know that as his son I tried to bring some closure for the family and see the place where his life ended.

I appreciate Madolyn's encouragement for me to make this journey. She wanted me to see the place and learn about the circumstances of the crash. I think she was as excited as I was. I'm glad we made the journey and had this wonderful adventure. I will hold this experience close to my heart. MM





When Magnolia Bible College closed its doors and turned out the lights seventeen years ago, it left its great library in the dark. I became interested in this library several years ago. Being a part of the family of God, which is the church of Christ, is one of the greatest blessings that can be bestowed upon baptized believers, and one that should drive us to our knees in humble adoration and thanksgiving, like Paul said in Eph 3:14-15, "For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named" (ESV).

Every Christian throughout the world is part of God's family. Whether the children in God's family live in China, India, or the Ukraine, Mexico, or the USA, they share a spiritual relationship with each other because they have been "born again...of the water and the spirit" (Jn 3:3,5). Paul reminded the Ephesian church, "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Eph 2:19). God's family is not restricted to any culture, ethnicity, age, or gender. Paul wrote, "For in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female" Gal 3:26-28).

God's family means we love and take care of one another, encourage and pray for one another, confess our sins to one another, and forgive one another. Sometimes we laugh and cry with one another and share our heartaches and sighs. The Corinthian church was told "for by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Cor 12:13), so "that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (v. 25-26). To the Roman church Paul admonished, "Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those that weep. Live in harmony with one another" (Rom 12:15-16). Paul urged the Galatian churches, "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Gal 6:10).

As God's family we dream together of how it will be when we all enter "into the city of the living God" (Heb 12:22) and become a part of the everlasting family of all the saved who are "enrolled in heaven" (v. 23). MM

THE "MYSTERY" OF MARRIAGE

In the letter to the Ephesians, Paul reveals a great connection between husbands and wives, and Christ and the church in Ephesians 5:22-32. He explains that "the husband is the head the wife, as Christ also is the head of the church." Because of this, as the wives are to be subject "to their husbands in everything," so

then "the church is subject to Christ" in everything.

This bond is based upon the love that each has for the other. "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself up for her." In this way the husband "nourishes and cherishes" the wife, "just as Christ also does the church."

Paul then takes this analogy to an even greater level as he writes, "This mystery is great; but I am speaking with reference to Christ and the church." This revealed

mystery is the connection between the family and the church. Foy E. Wallace rightfully concluded, "The sacredness of marriage is seen in God's design of it, from the very beginning, to be a figure of the union of Christ and his church; and the glorious importance of the church appears in the fact of its having been in the design of God from the

very beginning."

Husbands and wives were designed by God as a blessing to both, and in the same eternal plan, so was Christ and the church designed by God as a blessing to all mankind.

It is no coincidence that marriage and the church are linked together in many ways in the New Testament. God does nothing by accident. Rather "the manifold wisdom of God might now be made known through the church" (Ephesians 3:10). He designed the church, and then marriage to reflect the church. Yes, as Paul reveals, how great is this mystery!

Leaders of the church are chosen from where: The family. These leaders must be "the husband of one wife", and "manages his own household well." Notice the connection, "if a man does not know how to manage his own household, how will he take care of the church of God" (1 Timothy 3:2-5)?

Jesus did not arrive from the clouds to begin his ministry, but rather was "born of a woman" (Galatians 4:4), into a family, growing up as the carpenter's son, having brothers and sisters (Matthew 13:55). (Two of his earthly brothers wrote books in the New Testament: James and Jude.) Now notice, we then are born into "the household of God, which is the church of the living God" (1 Timothy 3:15); as such we are "adopted as sons" and are "children of God" and "fellow heirs with Christ" (Romans 8:14-17).

Within the church we enter a new relationship with our fellow man, that of "brethren," [i.e., brothers and sisters]. When Paul returned the converted slave Onesimus back to Philemon, he directed him to receive him back "no longer as a slave, but more than a slave, a beloved brother" (Philemon 16).

In a family the children inherit their parents' estate. So it is with the children of God who are no longer slaves to sin. "Therefore, you are no longer a slave, but a son; and if a son, then an heir through God" (Galatians 4:7), "being justified by His grace

> we would be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life" (Titus 3:7).

> > Praise to God that in His wisdom He gave the world two great institutions, Marriage, and the Church. Each organized as the other, each entered by birth, each based on forgiveness and love for one another, each with a great inheritance. How great is this Mystery! MM

Romans 15:4, 2 Timothy 3:15, and 1 Corinthians 10:8-11 give an excellent summary of why one should study the Old Testament. Paul says the Old Testament scripture:

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Testament. Paul says the Old Testament scriptures are for our learning, they make us wise, they comfort us, they are an example to us, and they admonish us.

To these very plain statements, we can list several additional reasons why we should study the Old Testament. These reasons may be gleaned, at least indirectly, from several Bible passages belonging to both testaments.

First, we must study the Old Testament because it furnishes the historical background for much of the New Testament. Books of Exodus and Numbers furnish the life situation and provide the context for Paul's warning statements in 1 Corinthians 10:1-13, Exodus 23:14-17, and Leviticus 23:1. These serve at least as a starting point for an explanation of Mark 11:15-17.

The need for exchange of money and animals arose with the practice of the Jews to worship and offer sacrifice in Jerusalem three times a year. Those Jews living long distances from Jerusalem found it extremely difficult and inconvenient to bring their sacrifices (animals) with them, thus they would purchase these animals in Jerusalem. This practice was later abused and corrupted into something that angered Jesus and prompted the words of Mark 11:17.

Also, Genesis, Exodus, and Joshua furnish us with the historical circumstances which Stephen rehearses before the Jews in Acts 7:1 and following. Lack of appreciation of the detail of these Old Testament events will cause us to sometimes miss the point of the New Testament writer.

Second, we must study the Old Testament because it helps us to understand the antitype recorded in the New Testament. Persons, events, and things in Scripture, and especially in the Old Testament, are often types (hints, shadows, sketches) of what later appear in the New Testament. The Passover lamb of Exodus 12 was the type (foreshadow, hint) of our Passover lamb, Jesus Christ.

The Hebrew writer mentions several entities (fulfillments) of the types recorded in the Old Testament. The cities of refuge (Numbers 30:6-8) were a type of the great spiritual refuge, the church of Jesus Christ (Hebrew 6:18). Melchizedek (Genesis 14:18-20) and his High Priesthood were a type of the high priesthood of Jesus Christ (Hebrews 6:20). The sacrifices of the old Covenant were a type of our sacrifice: Christ our savior (Hebrews 10:8-10). The Tabernacle of the Mosaic order (Exodus 25:9) was the type of Christ's Church and service in His Kingdom (Hebrews 9:17).

Aside from types, certain passages of the New Testament only make sense when measured beside the practices of the old covenant. Hebrews 10:22, when considered against the Old Testament practice of sprinkling the blood of sacrifices on the brazen altar and on the mercy seat of the ark of the covenant, does not teach that baptism is sprinkling. Rather, it teaches that when obedience occurs and one puts Christ on in baptism, the blood is applied to that one (Leviticus 1:1-7, Hebrews 10:22, 1 Peter 3:21).

Hebrews 7:27 is sometimes misunderstood and asserted to be a contradiction of Leviticus 16:11-19, until one looks closely at Leviticus 16, Exodus 27:20-21, and Leviticus 23:28-32. We must use the information God gave us in the Old Testament if we are going to fully understand all the New Testament.

Third, we must study the Old Testament because it teaches us the nature of God. Our desire to obey or disobey God is directly related to our perception of His character and nature. If we visualize God as a covenant-keeping, faithful, loving, powerful, promise-keeping God, our reaction to His will is going to be different than if we see Him as a weak, cruel, indifferent, "powder-puff," promise-breaking God. Every parent knows that his children's reception of his character is determined to a large degree on whether they respect and obey him. The same is true regarding our relationship with God.

The Old Testament tells us a great deal about God. He is creator, lawgiver, judge, and provider (Genesis 1:21,2:1ff). God is pure, holy, just, merciful, loving, and righteous (Hosea 11:9, Deuteronomy 32:4, Isaiah 42:2, Exodus 34:6, Jeremiah 3:12). When we read of man's fall in Eden (Geneses 3) and of Nadab and Abihu's destruction (Leviticus 10), we learn something of the nature of God. God is serious about man's obedience, and He is not one to be trifled with. He is a God who means what He says. The Biblical accounts of God's care for Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, and Israel, also reflect on God's nature (Genesis 12,28,33-50; Exodus 1-2; Ezekiel 16).

Fourth, we must study the Old Testament because it comforts and encourages us. We learn from Job, Jeremiah, kings, and a host of other Old Testament books that God loves His children, protects them, and blesses them. He is not indifferent to their needs and wants. He rewards those who are faithful to Him. We can find great comfort in these teachings.

Fifth, we must study the Old Testament because it gives us warnings (1 Corinthians 9:27, 10:1-12).

Sixth, the Old Testament demonstrates the reality of

We must study the Old Testament because it teaches us the nature of God.

Christ's claims (Luke 24:25-27, John 5:46-47, Acts 17:2-3).

Seventh, the Old Testament demonstrates the meaning of "by faith." Able, Enoch, Noah, Sarah, Abraham, Rahab, Gideon,

David, and Samuel all led lives that help us to appreciate what faith is and what sacrifices must be made if we would also be faithful children of God.

This article has by no means exhausted the reasons why we should study the Old Testament, but I hope it has stirred us all who want to know more about the Old Testament. MM

We appreciate so much the opportunity to inform you about our mission work among the churches in North Mississippi. We appreciate the Germantown church of Christ sponsoring us in this ministry. This report covers twelve Sundays during the months of August through October 2022. I served three of those Sundays as an interim preacher for the Coffeeville church of Christ and three Sundays for the Indianola church of Christ. Both churches are looking for full-time ministers. Please be praying for them.

Jerry Coats has been the preacher there



My lifelong friends, Steve and Jane Watson, continue this great ministry of sending supplies to churches and hospitals in Venezuela. With Cristian and Angelica, a Venezuelan couple they converted, they continue to send three to four thousand pounds of food, medical supplies, baby formula, and other needed items, every month to this starving country. Here is a brief look at this beautiful country before and after the reign of a brutal dictator.

Then ...

- *A country of loving people filled with hope for the future!
- *A land of gorgeous beaches, scenic mountains and lush grass lands!
- *A prosperous people with the average

Venezuelan making an annual income of \$75,000 per year.

*A stable country with ample natural resources (largest oil reserves in South America).

■ Now . . .

- *The poorest country in South America! *A country that has seen app. seven million people flee! This is 20% of the population! 75% of the remaining population are facing starvation!
- *A country where the average Venezuela adult lost 25 lbs. last year due to lack of sufficient food! Starvation is rampant! *A country with insufficient medicines and medical care. Currently, there is a 75% shortage of medicines! We have sent

\$300,000-\$400,000 (U.S retail) to 7 hospitals, 25 physicians, several individuals who are now distributing medical supplies to those in need. Lives are being saved.

Parents In The Pews

It wasn't just sympathy; it was pure empathy. It was 4 AM. My wife, three young kids, a friend, and I had been standing in line to check-in our bags at the airport and to



receive our tickets. Everyone was groggy and tired. To make matters worse, we were standing in the longest check-in line I had ever seen. The line snaked all the way through their barriers, went down the long hallway of the airport, and around the corner towards the shops and restaurants. This line could have dwarfed even the longest lines at Six Flags. The sheer magnitude of the line made everyone seriously worried about missing their flight.

As we slowly progressed, a young couple caught my attention. The wife was probably 8-months pregnant and had a little girl around 2-years-old. In addition to everything they had already endured at 4 AM that morning, the child chose this very moment to let the entire airport know that she had reached her limit. She began an epic wailing that just might have made some nearby seismographs quiver. The parents' consoling wasn't working. This little girl was done with this situation. However, since everyone had been standing in line for over an hour, they couldn't leave the line, especially since they were finally getting closer to the check-in desk. There was very little this couple could do but hope the crying wouldn't break any nearby glass.

Without a doubt, it was a moment of horror for these parents. I had walked in their shoes before, and they were sneakers I wished to never walk in again. I felt very helpless for them. So, as they finally got checked in and walked by me, child screaming the whole way, I offered what small measure of encouragement I could: "Hang in there, guys. You're doing a great job."

I've encountered countless moments like this with my own family. I've encountered them in the airport and at the grocery store. I've encountered them at my friends' homes. But perhaps more than any other, I've encountered them in the pew during worship.

It can be quite the challenge. We have felt embarrassed. We have wondered if judging eyes have fallen upon our family. We've wondered if disapproving eyes are critiquing our parenting. And more than anything else, we've had doubts if we're doing things right as a parent. And then one of the most encouraging things happens -- a sweet member will come up and say, "Hang in there, guys. You're doing a great job."

I know I'm not alone. Nearly every young parent wrestles with these very thoughts. So for all the parents out there, please hang in there. You're doing a great job! Children are a tremendous blessing from the Lord (Psalm 127:3-5), and you're bringing your children to worship the Lord. You're doing what you can to train up your children in the Lord (Proverbs 22:6; Ephesians 6:4). So keep at it!

And for the rest of the members, please keep doing what you can to encourage us parents (Hebrews 3:13). Remember that children in the worship assemble (both loud and quiet) are signs of church growth, vibrance, energy, and life. So, keep showing us love and smiles as we try to train up the next generation of leaders in the church. Keep helping us with our children when we've reached those overwhelming moments. Above all, keep praying for us. We need it more than we will ever admit. MM

I read an interesting article, Under The Influence, by Clista Heintzman, which expounded the influence of women's power over men. She cited Biblical cases of negative influence prompting men to behave in reckless and sinful ways. Of course, this did not give men a free pass on accountability!

"Long Live the King!"
As the death of Queen Elizabeth was announced we heard the words, "Long live the King!" The Monarchy would continue. While England has lived under a monarchy, America rejected the King's rule and fought to be free from his power and instead established a constitutional republic. In effect, we wanted to rule ourselves.

Perhaps this is a barrier to us in America understanding that as Christians we must live our lives under the rule of a King. God proclaimed of his Son, "I have installed My King upon Zion, My holy mountain" (Ps. 2:6). After his birth, the wise men came seeking "He who has been born King of the Jews" (Mt. 2:2). As Jesus was welcomed into Jerusalem the people shouted, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord" (Lu. 19:38).

At his trial Pilate asked him if he were a King? "You say correctly that I am a King. For this I have been born, and for this I have come into the world" (Jn. 18:37). Jesus was resurrected to become our king, "the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords" (1 Ti. 6:15). Christianity is not a democracy. We bow before a King, we serve a living King, we are children of the King. Our lives are to honor our King and be subservient to his commands. LONG LIVE THE KING!

"Full of Sap and Very Green"

The lifetime Missionary, Joe Cannon, was in his eighties and in poor health when his elders advised that he not return to the mission field. He went anyway, replying, "I can be just as weak and tired over there as I can be here." The great Canadian preacher, J. C. Bailey, after preaching for 40 years, at age 60, began mission work in India. His first five years over 20,000 were baptized. He continued to preach in India until he was 87 years old.

Moses was eighty years old when he stood before the burning bush. He would set a nation free and lead them to the promise land. "Although Moses was one hundred and twenty years old when he died, his eye was not dim, nor his vigor abated" (De. 34:7). Just because we are drawing Social Security, does not mean God is finished with us. Just the opposite. It is in our senior years that God has us trained to do some of our greatest work.

The Psalmist compared the Righteous to "a cedar in Lebanon," saying, "They will still yield fruit in old age; They shall be full of sap and very green" (Ps. 92: 12, 14). It is the faithful senior citizens that lead our churches, care for the sick, travel to foreign lands to reach the lost, and are a strong influence on their grandchildren. Look to the older Christians in your congregation, how dedicated they are to the Lord, and realize there is still a lot of sap flowing through those old veins!

Meal provided afterwards by Blackwater BBQ and members of the Blackwater Macedonia congregation."

We commend Brandon for using his facility each year to reach out to his community. What Brandon Glover does, with David Lipe preaching each night, is in the same evangelistic spirit we find in the New Testament. Paul preached in the Areopagus on Mars Hill. We read of that success too, as "some men joined him and believed, among whom also were Dioysius the Areopagite and a woman named Dameris and others with them" (Acts 17:34).

I hope this effort inspires others to turn their businesses, garages, or barns, into places people can come and hear the gospel! MM


