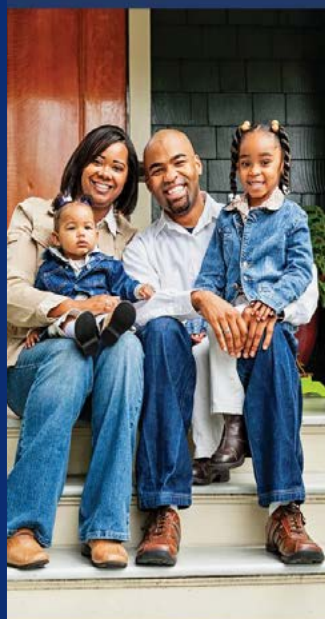

# 40 YEARS OF WORKING *the Mission fields in Cuba*

In April of this year the Clinton, MS, church of Christ conducted their 40th evangelistic campaign in Cuba. The campaign consists of visiting members and conducting Bible studies. These have resulted in 1,215 baptisms.

About 49% of Cubans are Catholic, 49% atheists and 2% Protestant. Less than 1% of Catholics attend Mass on a regular basis. You can ask them, "When was the last time you went to the Catholic Church?" and they will generally answer, "When I was baptized as baby." Less than 5% of the Cubans attend any kind of church service. That is the lowest percentage of any country in the Western Hemisphere.

When Fidel Castro became president of Cuba in 1959, there were 60 congregations of the Lord's church, with 3,000 members. When he came to power he placed a ban on Christianity, and atheism became the national religion. The Christians had to worship "underground." If they were caught worshipping, they could be put in jail, lose their jobs, or be punished in other ways. To keep from being detected, they would worship in different houses at various times of the day, and when they sang, they sang in whispers. Now the Cubans have freedom of religion. In 1991, a delegation from the Lord's church went to Cuba on a fact-finding trip. They found only 8 to 12 congregations with 300 to 400 Christians worshipping there.

Bill Stough (now deceased) and James Andrews from the U. S., who were on that fact-finding trip, were watching for the opportunity to work in Cuba. They organized a campaign for that country in the spring of 1993, which was as soon as the Cuban government would allow. This was the first U. S. led campaign to go into Cuba since Castro became president. Juan Monroy, from Spain, and perhaps some others, had led campaigns there before. There were 17 of us on that first campaign.

Upon arriving in Cuba, we were divided into groups of 2 or 3 and sent to different cities to work. Brad Blair, of Chattanooga, TN, and I were sent to the city of Matanzas. Working in this city was an afterthought and no plans had been made for the

work there. Chano Fernandez, the preacher, was in the hospital recovering from surgery. However, the Cuban Christians began working with us and we had a number of Bible studies resulting in 22 baptisms.

When we arrived in Matanzas, that congregation was six months old. There were 24 members, and they met in the preacher's living room. It was not long before they outgrew those facilities. The Clinton Church of Christ raised money to buy a piece of property to build on. At that time, it was against Cuban law to build a church building. However, a house could be built for the preacher to live in with enough space for the church to meet in it. A house was built with a covered patio out back that could seat between 300 and 400 people. It is warm enough in Cuba that no heat is needed. Fans were installed for summer comfort. The property is completely enclosed so there is no outside interference.

Extremely few people in Cuba have cars; therefore, if there is no congregation in walking distance people cannot worship. To remedy this, the congregation in Matanzas planted 52 congregations in the province so there is one close enough for most everyone to attend. There are several capable men in the Matanzas congregation who go out every Sunday

afternoon and preach for these congregations.

On April 19 of this year, Glenn Newell and Robert Shelton boarded a plane for a two-week campaign in Cuba. While there we preached, conducted a number of Bible studies, and visited church members for the purpose of encouraging them. There is a fuel shortage in Cuba which limited our travel, but we were still able to travel to cities such as Cardenas, Alacarnes, and the Bay of Pigs. We conducted Bible studies and baptized several people at these locations. The Cuban Christians invited their friends, neighbors, and relatives to study with us. In this campaign we had 35 baptisms.

There is another Cuba campaign scheduled for October 2024. In addition to what we are doing, Tony Fernandez, the regular preacher in Matanzas, is teaching and baptizing people on a regular basis. The church in Cuba is growing. **MM**

## Sing, Sang, Sung, and "Say, What?"

*This issue, we will focus on two interesting questions we've received about the music of our worship. To protect institutions or individuals that were mentioned, both have been slightly paraphrased from the way they were originally received. Hope our thoughts prove helpful.*

### YOUR WONDERFUL QUESTIONS:

**QUESTION #1** – What's the difference between a Christian University coming to perform at our churches and a praise team? Is it okay just because our elders have not declared it an "hour of worship?" Thank you.

**QUESTION #2** – Brother Dan, I have reached out to you before and I always appreciate your answers and kind demeanor. I had a question about instrumental music. "Will God send me to Hell because I sing in worship with mechanical instruments?" I ask this because sometimes we (myself included) are consumed with wondering if something is a Heaven or Hell issue rather than viewing it from the standpoint of 'what God wants?'

### MY THOUGHTS:

I want to thank both of you for thinking. When discussing the music of our worship—or any other Bible subject—I've encountered five types of people.

- **Some aren't willing to think.** They automatically classify something as right or wrong because of their traditional experience. Read Matthew 15:1-9 to see what Jesus says about this mindset. Hint. It's not very favorable.
- **Some don't want to think.** They're happy with the latest fad-of-faith promoted by their religious community and they do what they want to do. Read Colossians 2:20-23 to see what God thinks

about the worship of "self-made religion." Caution. You may not like it.

- **Some think they've already thought.** They've respectfully been told what to think and are content in their comfort zone. Read Acts 18:24-28 and Acts 26:9-19 to see if that kind of thinking made Apollos and Paul great servants of Jesus. You might be surprised.

- **Some aren't happy if you think.** They're "quick on the flaw" and critically jump to conclusions when you don't say what they want you to say ... the way they think you should say it. Really?! Matthew 7:1-5 and Romans 14:1-13 are still in my Bible. How about yours?

- **Some are happy to think.** They know what they believe and, with a proper use of God's word, they're not afraid to be challenged for the sake of truth. Read James 3:13-18 and see if an "open to reason" mind isn't what we are to have. All of that said, let's look at our questions.

First, what should we say about the difference between choruses and praise teams? We might want to remember the main New Testament word for "worship": *proskuneo*, "to kiss toward." To worship God is to purposefully sacrifice our feelings to him. That requires INTENT. If there is not an intent to worship, it's not worship ... even if the activity mentions the names God, Jesus, Spirit, or directs our thoughts to spiritual matters. Accordingly, we can listen to hymns and spiritual songs or listen to a Christian University Chorus for the sheer joy of music and do so without worshipping if the intent of expressing our feelings to God is not there.

If by "praise teams" you're talking about a plurality of people leading others to sing songs that are intended to praise God, that's worship, and it must be regulated by the authority of scripture

(Colossians 3:16-17). If the “team” involves women leading dual-gendered audiences, scripture prohibits such a practice (1 Timothy 2:11-14). If the “team” is a plurality of men, authorized expediency would allow for multiple song leaders as much as it allows for one. But, we must remember that God wants nothing to do with orchestrated confusion in our worship (1 Corinthians 14:40, the context of this passage is about worship).

Second, what are we to say about God sending someone to Hell for worshipping with mechanical instruments of worship. Watch how I word this! “When it comes to the worship of God’s church on earth, the only music He authorizes is vocal music.” His words are sing, sang, sung, and fruit of the lips (Acts 16:25; Romans 15:9; 1 Corinthians 14:15; : after “Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16; Hebrews 2:12; 13:15; James 5:13). Does God know what He wants? Can He adequately express what He wants? So, what does He want? Acapella music, pure and simple.

Now, what about God sending someone to Hell for attempting to worship with mechanical instruments? Let me respond to that with four brief observations.

**Observation #1**—Like it or not, today’s culture calls for a less-than-judgmental interaction with others. The feelings of others must never dictate what we believe. But, when it comes to sharing our faith, what we believe teaches us to consider the feelings of others (1 Peter 3:15; cf. Ephesians 4:15). “Do we want others to be right OR do we just want to prove that we are right?” Our answer to the above question needs to be thoughtful and respectful.

**Observation #2**—Our place is to lovingly and clearly teach others what the Bible says ... what God wants (2 Timothy 4:2; 1 Peter 4:11) with a hope of drawing them into His favor. Like Paul, we must remember the cultural sensitivities of others and, without compromise, “become all things to all people, that by

all means [we] might save some” (1 Corinthians 9:22). That means our response to the above question needs to be considerate.

**Observation #3**—The Bible clearly says there is only one lawgiver and judge (James. 4:12). That would be God, and He has delegated His final Judgement to Jesus (John 5:30). He has appointed: (a) the day for determining our destinies and (b) the one who will make that determination (Acts 17:30). I am not that one. Today is not that day. Those thoughts should also help us with the above question.

**Observation #4**—Our answer to any Bible question should be wrapped in the sentiment of these words: “Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person” (Colossians 4:6).

Soooo, here’s my affectionate response to the question at hand. “I am not the one who is going to determine your destiny, but I will prayerfully remind you that God has been very clear about the music He wants in worship. I know what He wants and, if I love Him, why would I want to give Him anything else ... anything He has not authorized for His worship of the church on earth? I don’t think either one of us would be comfortable standing before Jesus on the Day of Judgment knowing we did what we wanted instead of what God wanted.”

Folks, the Bible says, “Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves” (2 Corinthians 13:5). We need to make certain we do that when it comes to the way we worship. We must be equally sure we do that when it comes to the way we answer questions about our worship. Both should be carefully and obediently crafted for the glory of our God. Amen?! **MM**

# HOUSE TO HOUSE Worldwide!

*House to House Heart to Heart is known primarily for our work in the United States. Some may not know that House to House does almost as much work internationally! So far, we have worked with congregations in 124 different countries. We hope to eventually work with a group of Christians in every country.*

*House to House is printed monthly in English, bi-monthly in Spanish, and frequently in British English, Chinese, French, Korean, Latvian, Nepali, Polish, Portuguese, Romanian, Ukrainian, and several Indian dialects.*

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*Here are some recent updates on some of these international efforts.*

## ● **Ukrainian Relief Efforts and Evangelism**

At the beginning of the war, HTH staff members joined life-long missionaries to Ukraine and Russia in weekly Zoom meetings to discuss how to help those affected by the war. The goal was to help physically and spiritually. We translated three of our best tracts into three languages to be shared with refugees and those welcoming them. They were provided in English, Polish, Romanian, and Ukrainian. Copies have been included with some of the supplies given out all over each of the countries.

## ● **Evangelism Posters Around the World**

Earlier this year we mailed a free evangelism poster to every church of Christ in the United States. We also emailed a copy of the English and Spanish versions to every church of Christ whose email address we had in the world. Keith Kasarjian loved the evangelism poster so much that he asked if we would send him some to take as he visits/starts Bear Valley preaching schools. Keith sends us pictures of those who receive the poster all over the world.

The evangelism posters, which we also turned into a bookmark and PowerPoint slides, have also been translated into Farsi and Spanish. They are currently being translated into French and Latvian.

## ● **HTH in Korean**

A church in South Korea is trying to translate all of our issues into

Korean. They keep them on this site and then update them as they go. <https://housetohouse.kr/>

## ● **HTH in Portuguese**

We have translated the July 2021 issue, *The New Testament in Just 12 Verses – An Introduction to Christianity*, into several languages. Portuguese is the newest. It is finished and we are just waiting on a congregation in Brazil to print it. When they print, we will send digital files to Angola and Mozambique to print and distribute. We have not worked with the church in Angola and Mozambique until now.

## ● **HTH in Nepali**

The church in Nepal is translating House to House into their language, Nepali. The first issue has been printed and is being distributed.

## ● **Direct Mail in Guam**

Some countries have a connection with the US Postal Service. For those that do, House to House can be direct mailed into the homes in that country! The July 2024 issue of House to House is currently being mailed into homes in Guam.

## ● **Canada**

Matt Wallin spoke at the Strathmore Blvd. congregation in Toronto, Canada, in 2023. Austin Fowler spoke there in 2024. The congregation is very evangelistic and made up of members from 30+ nations! Todd Clippard, who answers House to House Bible questions that come in online or through the mail, spoke at River-view church of Christ in Riverview, New Brunswick, in 2024. We are thankful for a growing relationship with the church in Canada!

## ● **Helping Your Mission Work**

Most congregations support some kind of mission work. For those that do, House to House has been a great tool. Congregations who support a missionary often pay to have copies of House to House sent to them. Congregations that are planting churches or going on



short-term mission trips order copies to take with them.

We can help supply customized, affordable materials for their work. Each copy of House to House is just .20 cents.

If your missionary is willing, we can work with them to get our material translated into their language and they can have the copies printed locally.

If someone asks you for resources in any language, just ask us! There is a good chance we have SOMETHING in their language or know someone who does.

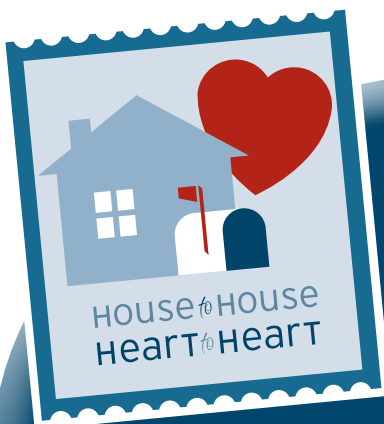

# CAMP BEBRUSAI LITHUANIA, 2024

## Family Camp

During the week of July 22-27, 126 folks from eleven countries gathered at Camp Bebrusai near Moletai, Lithuania, for rest and refreshment in the Lord. This, the Baltic Family Camp, began in 2012 for the purpose of offering missionary and ministry families, along with Christians across Europe, an opportunity for spiritual retreat and renewal. God blessed this summer's edition with great success as participants from Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Ukraine, Belarus, Germany, the Czech Republic, England, Spain, and the United States spent the week focused on the theme of "Not of this World."

Each day the adults experienced rich Bible study while their children and teenagers enjoyed their own schedule of Bible classes, games and activities, along with arts and crafts. This year our guest teachers for the adults were Drs. Evert and Ileene Huffard of Memphis, TN, and Mitch Anderson from the town of Olomouc in the Czech Republic. These gifted teachers provided in-depth study for the men and women who attended—making the classes one of the most anticipated segments of the camp.

The camp setting on the beautiful lake fosters relaxation and rest for those serving throughout this region of Europe, most often in small isolated congregations. For them the camp is a highlight of their year, giving them the chance to enjoy the kind of fellowship, teaching, and encouragement that we, in the states, sometimes take for granted.

Attending this year was Alexander Piletsky and his wife, Irene. You may have heard about this courageous couple from Mariupol, Ukraine. Last year, they, along with over 30 other Christians sheltered for days in their church building in that city as shells exploded all around them. They survived in part, by collecting dirty water to drink out of bomb craters. Alexander was hit in the face by shrapnel—his scar very much evident. He shared this incredibly compelling story with us during the week. He spoke of their rule of keeping two walls between them and the warzone erupting around them—hoping that two walls might protect them from the artillery—as they waited on God to deliver them. And hallelujah, He did! Now Alexander serves as a preacher in the church in

Tallinn, Estonia, where they have relocated.

More amazing stories of courageous faith were represented at this camp, such as the family who fled Belarus because of persecution—escaping just as police were searching to imprison them. Now living in Germany, they drove 20 hours to attend the session. Liza, the wife and mom in this family, grew up attending the Christian youth camp in Lithuania, crossing over the Belarussian border with a group from the church in Minsk during

better times in the early 2000s. Now she and her husband bring their own kids to enjoy their own Christian camp experience.

That these

different people from such diverse countries in that troubled part of the world could be together, overcoming political and nationalistic barriers to honor God as one people, is a sweeping testimony to the power of the Gospel of Christ. It is reflective of John's statement in Revelation 7:9 of him seeing, "a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb." It is quite an amazing and uplifting experience to witness God working in and through this camp in this way. It truly is "not of this world." There simply is no other explanation.

Of course, for the families to be free to enjoy their week, it takes a dedicated staff to serve them. The Baltic Family Camp is blessed with terrific servants from the Levy Church of Christ in North Little Rock, Arkansas, which sponsors the camp, along with a couple of Mississippians (David and Lourelia Pryor) from the Lake Harbor Drive congregation in Ridgeland.

Christian camping in Lithuania, after all, has deep Mississippi roots. It began in 1998, when a group mainly from Sardis Lake Christian Camp made the journey over to introduce this ministry concept to that country. It remains strong there with both the youth and family camp continuing each summer.

Mission work in Europe remains most challenging. The continent is overwhelmingly secular. War is still raging in the region. Missionaries there have tremendous tasks. Please keep praying for them as they proclaim Christ to their land and for the Baltic Family Camp as we strive to minister to them through the camp and the connections made during that wonderful week. God is working in the Baltics and all throughout Europe! **MM**

# Was Jesus POLITICAL?

I have been mulling over this question for quite some time. It is an increasingly significant one, particularly since Jesus is frequently used to prop up political agendas from all over the spectrum.

"Support me (or my cause). Jesus is on my side!"

Then there are the theologians and biblical scholars who also make various claims as to the politics of Jesus. Some deny that He had any direct political involvement while others support a highly political Jesus.

***Who are we to believe?***

***Well, you could say it is complex.***

In any attempt to sort through this, I think we must first look at the term "political." If we frame it just in our current cultural usage, then to me it appears that Jesus was not really into politics at all. He could not run for any office. He did not lead any public political protests; make any overt political demands for Himself or His followers; try to create an organized political party; or attempt to ingratiate Himself to the political powers that were during His lifetime. In fact, when an effort was made to draw Him into a potential political discussion, He deflected it (Mark 12:16-17).

During His life, He seemed content to live under the existing Roman political system, even advising His followers to not fight against it (Matthew 5:41). This certainly does not paint a picture of a radically political Jesus. So, from this view of the Christ, I personally cannot picture Him marching in some rally for or against something now; leading a political party or movement; or seeking a political office.

***Would this Jesus even vote?***

***I honestly do not know.***

Could He be considered more political within His own Jewish community? This is the better question. He certainly challenged the existing political ruling structure in and around Jerusalem. He posed such a threat to their regime that they manipulated the Roman system to have Him killed. Turning over tables and turning

out the money changers could certainly be considered a bold political move.

***But what kind of politics?***

***Again, He desired no office.***

He did have followers, but even within the Jewish community they never sought political power. Amazingly, just the opposite was true. Jesus specifically taught His disciples to not grasp for the kind of power that defines politics (Matthew 20:25-27). He obviously lived His teaching. So, what are we to make of this?

Don't you think that if the King of Kings so desired, He could have called upon legions of angels, swept the Romans and the Sanhedrin away, and taken up residence on David's throne, fulfilling the Zionist Messianic dream? But He did not. That was not His brand of politics. And I think this is exactly where we end up confused. Jesus is not an American. He is certainly not a Republican or a Democrat, and neither does He belong to any political party anywhere. He is not into this kind of politics. Actually, embedded within His teaching and that of His followers in the New Testament is a basic ethic, which subverts this brand of politics.

Ever heard of a politician stumping for votes on a platform including "love your enemies," "turn the other cheek," or "love your neighbor as yourself?" How about "not to think of yourself more highly than you ought," "bless those who persecute you and do not curse," or "do not repay evil for evil?" Or what about "let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another?" Didn't think so.

To see the political Jesus, just read the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), it perfectly captures His brand of subversive politics. It undermined the accepted norm—the practice of power politics from both the Roman and Jewish perspectives. Asked to carry a Roman's bag one mile—make it two. Trying to manipulate the Torah to your advantage—think again! Those "blessed" are not the strongest, the richest, the most advantaged, the most politically placed. No, those truly blessed are the poor, the mournful, the meek, the merciful, the pure, the peacemakers, and the persecuted. Wow!

No wonder "the crowds were amazed at his teaching" (Mat-

thew 7:28). They had never heard anyone speak such things—especially politicians and people in power.

Jesus's politics demolishes business-as-usual politics. Recall Matthew 20:25-27 again: "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant and whoever wants to be first must be your slave."

Jesus's first followers took all of this to heart. Their grassroots movement changed the world, but not through power politics. They sought no office nor engaged in any political lobbying or posturing (unless you count Paul appealing to his Roman citizenship for a trial before Caesar). Instead, they were taught to obey and pray for whatever form of political government they happened to be under and to live "peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" and not to rebel against such authority (See 1 Timothy 2:1-4; Romans 13:1-7; 1 Peter 2:13-17). And these statements were made to Christians living under anything but a democratic form of government.

So how did they change the world then without a political machine, without accumulating power and position? The answer is the politics of Jesus, the subversive nature of His teaching, and the power unleashed by the Spirit in the Kingdom of God.

This Kingdom knows no boundaries, has no nationality, is not limited by any particular form of government, is not beholden to the whims of politicians, does not depend on any nation, and is quite unstoppable.

It has thrived in such hostile environments as totalitarian states and communist governments, as well as friendlier democratic and republic forms of government. Those in this Kingdom have their citizenship in Heaven and are to be "aliens" and "strangers" in whatever place they may find themselves on the map (Philippians 3:20; 1 Peter 2:11).

What primarily guides them, shapes their goals, and defines their behavior, is not found in any constitution, government document, or political platform.

It is the politics of Jesus—subverting the callous, loveless, power-grasping, brutal, unforgiving, unmerciful, deceptive, self-seeking, intolerant, murderous, dehumanizing culture through quiet but purposeful Kingdom living and teaching.

It was once said that His ragtag group of followers—who without power or any political advantage—"turned the world upside down" (Acts 17:6). They accomplished this without any ballots or bullets. Rather, it was by faith.

Faith—not in any form of government, political party, politician, or country, but in the Most High God and His eternal plans for His unstoppable Kingdom. **MM**

# THE MISSION WORK IN *Africa*

Africa, the second-largest continent, presents unparalleled opportunities for evangelization with its vast number of unreached souls and extensive land. Comprising 54 countries, diverse religions, and approximately 1,500-2,000 languages, Africa's rich cultural and religious tapestry necessitates a nuanced approach to evangelization. Understanding and respecting these differences while adapting our message of the Gospel and strategies for spreading it are crucial for effective outreach and mission work.

The history of the Church in Nigeria, the most populous country in Africa with 223,804,632 people and the largest black nation in the world, is a testament to the power of indigenous evangelism. C.A.O. Essien, an ex-policeman, learned of Jesus through a Bible correspondence course in 1948. He and a friend baptized one another and established the church with a dozen village neighbors. By the time resident Americans arrived, there were an estimated twenty-five congregations. This foundation laid by local believers highlights the potential of Africans evangelizing Africa, leveraging their deep cultural and language understanding to communicate the Gospel effectively. Today, Africa has the fastest growth in Christianity, with more congregations and members than any other continent. According to Pew Research, by 2060, more than 4 in 10 Christians are expected to live in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Although my daytime job is in cancer research and teaching, I also serve as a deacon of Global Missions at Oliver Creek Church of Christ. My wife, Pamela, a nurse, and I have led numerous mission trips to Africa for over twenty years. Oliver Creek adopted the Africa Mission work as one of their four missionary efforts they supported (including missions in Ukraine, Argentina, and Greece) in 2022. The mission work in Africa embraces the potential for growth by building relationships with remote communities, spending a month in the summer and two weeks in the winter to

establish trust and understanding. We focus on collaborating with local professionals, such as doctors and preachers, to evangelize Africa through what we call "The Jesus Method"—a blend of preaching and humanitarian efforts.

Our goal is to empower local churches in North and West Africa, reaching nearly 50 million people. We focus on evangelism, church planting, and addressing health challenges like high blood pressure, malaria, waterborne diseases, and diabetes. Partnering with local preachers, teachers, doctors, and church leaders, we conduct medical outreaches and preaching campaigns using the 4-Field Disciple Method (evangelism, discipleship, church planting, and leadership development) and provide tools for sustained

efforts year-round. We provide resources for preaching, education, free health clinics, and poverty alleviation initiatives. Fundraising efforts are not for preachers' salaries, but to facilitate the vital work they perform. We believe in empowering local churches to take responsibility for community outreach projects like those Oliver Creek actively supports.

Pam and I visit various places in Nigeria to support community growth and spiritual development and engage in campaigns using the 4-Field Disciple Method. Additionally, we distribute laptops and cell phones to improve communication and manage projects like building church buildings. During recent outreach, the community received essential health services, including

blood pressure checks, blood sugar tests, and malaria screenings. Complimentary medications were distributed, and while the medical team addressed health needs, evangelists presented the Gospel of Christ. Many individuals, including Pentecostal church leaders, a military officer, and several Muslims, chose to be baptized.

One of our significant impacts has been through the radio program "Let the Bible Speak," which reaches the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) of Nigeria and beyond. The program has led to numerous baptisms and the establishment of new congregations. One notable conversion is Victor Yusuf Olukayode, a former General Overseer of a Pentecostal denomination, who embraced







the true faith through our broadcasts. His journey exemplifies the transformative power of the Gos-

pel, leading to the establishment of a Bible training program for new converts. This effort led to the establishment of the first-ever Christian radio station, Truth and Life Radio, run by the churches

of Christ in Northern Africa. With the support of the OC mission team, Truth and Life Radio Station started broadcasting in February 2024, aiming to provide daily content, including preaching, discussions, music, and uplifting messages.

Our mission is a testament to the belief that "It is not so much the case that God has a mission for His church in the world, as that God has a church for His mission in the world." We are humbled and honored to be entrusted with such a significant task, witnessing God working globally in the hearts of many through the efforts of His missionaries and the support of OC and our partner churches. **MM**



## THE MISSION FIELDS OF *Thailand*

Thailand is a country in southeast Asia. The country is populated by 66 million people and most of the people (about 95%) claim Buddhist affiliation. Our mission's goal was "To establish a faithful congregation" where there is none.

Our great and challenging task started (May 2007) here in the city of Kalasin where about 150,000 people live. To fulfill our goal and the Great Commission of the Lord, we started making contacts by going from house to house to meet people. Church of Christ was introduced to the people in communities. Tracts, flyers, booklets were distributed. We found that most of the people were very friendly, but none of them really wanted to have Bible studies with us. When people heard about a religion foreign to theirs, they feared change. If they changed, they felt like they became a traitor to their country and their ancestors' religion (Buddhism). Discouragement was occupied for times. But it could not have enough power to extinguish the great love of God for mankind. We knew God will provide people with good hearts.



We continued to walk to our goal. Beginning is always difficult. We do our part; God will do His!

After almost a year, the first two souls in the city obeyed the Gospel. On one hand, and generally, new Christians are very helpful to the work. They have friends. They have family members. This opens more opportunity for us to make connections in order for us to share the Gospel of Christ with the people our new converts know. On the other hand, their friends and family members could also become the enemy to their faith. Those unbelieving folks may try to pull the believers back to where they were before. We have experienced this latter case, and there was not a small number.

As our effort went, more souls were added to the Lord's church.

The church at Kalasin currently has 35-40 people in attendance. We have also established 3 other congregations in other areas in this region of N.E Thailand. The believers continued to be grounded in the faith through our edification program called "Weekend Bible School" (WBS). We also run a preacher training school to train men to serve the Lord. And each congregation continues to do the work of the church. **MM**

This scripture clearly tells women not to teach or usurp authority over men, but there are many kinder, gentler, and less aggressive ways to be part of spreading the message of Christ.

Let's think about the involvement of women in Christ's mission today.

### Women can choose to join in **CHRIST'S MISSION** by following Him as disciples.

We need to let our lights shine. We know the difference between right and wrong. By making the choices in our lives that show we intend to live by God's standards and not those of the world, we demonstrate we are a testament to the Truth. When we do good, our light shines—not because we think we are good, but because God has given us the standards and ability to make the proper choices and we want to glorify Him with our lives. 1 Corinthians 6:20 states, "for you were bought with a price. So, glorify God in your body."

- *Present a welcome basket for a new neighbor or a visitor at church services*
- *Send out cards for birthdays, anniversaries, get well cards, Start a card ministry*
- *Offer assistance to widows and shut-ins*
- *Offer to help coordinate or participate in a Ladies' Day*



- Invite a new neighbor, friend or a visitor at church to eat lunch
- Sign up to serve at a local Stew Pot or community kitchen

The Great Commission can be found in Matthew 28:18-19 and states, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the father and of the son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always to the end of time." Women in the church should reflect on their gifts, skills, and life situations to consider ways they can support the work of Christ locally and around the world.

- Give monetarily to Christ's church that supports foreign missionaries
- Give monetarily to Christ's church to support local missions

If you live by the Bible's standard, women will not stand in front of a congregation of men and women and preach the Gospel. (1 Corinthians 14.) However, your effect and influence on others outside of the church should be evident. Matthew 5: 13-16 states, "You [and the word means all, male and female] are the salt of the earth. You are the light of the world. Let your light shine before others so that they may see your good works and give glory to your father who is in Heaven."

Notice how very effective and influential the Samaritan woman was, though. She did not fill a pulpit. She spoke one-on-one to those who knew her, and her enthusiasm is evident. She was not a perfect person, but when those who knew her saw the changes she had made and the clear message she spoke, they couldn't help but be persuaded to come and hear for themselves the preaching of the Gospel. "So the woman left her water jar and went away into town and said to the people, 'Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did. Can this be the Christ?'" They went out of the town and were coming to him" (John 4:28-30). It is never too late to get to work in God's kingdom! If you are not active, get active now.

May God bless each of our efforts as we seek to join in Christ's mission and do His will. **MM**

Since its beginning, members of the Germantown congregation have had an interest in "mission work." In the early years that interest expressed itself through participation in campaigns, short-term work, chiefly in Central America. Supplemental funds were sent to various missionaries outside the USA. A turning point came in the late 1990s, however, when Dave Phillips, Germantown's preacher, taught a class on "Missions." The initial outcomes of that class were the formation of a Missions Committee and an elder-approved Missions Policy that called for a transition to a more focused and proactive approach to the church's global work. It decided to provide greater financial, emotional, spiritual, and sponsorship support to fewer evangelistic workers. That goal came to initial fulfillment when they provided full support for and sent the Leslie Williams family to PNG in 2001. Their mission was to plant and nurture a church in Milne Bay, Alotau, the provincial capital city.

The Williams family, Canadians, had previously worked in PNG for eight years, so they knew the nature of the work. Supported fully by Germantown, they worked ten years in residence: a church was planted and developed to the point of having good local leaders. The Williams family returned to Canada to work and make periodic trips to PNG for teaching and encouragement. Germantown continues to support the Williams in these works.

From 2008 to the present, the Germantown church has fully supported Sasha Maliuga, first in Donetsk and later in Kyiv, Ukraine, where he is the preacher of a local congregation and teaches in the Ukrainian Bible Institute. Natasha, his wife, is equally active in various aspects of the work and is a skilled translator.

A small slice of the evangelism budget at Germantown goes to people who make short-term trips, mostly to Latin America, to engage in a combination of benevolent work, encouragement, and evangelizing. Others, however, have gone to Ghana, Jamaica, Nigeria, and Canada for teaching and encouragement. Limited support is also given toward the development of leaders in Ghana.

In May of this year (2024), Germantown began a partnership with Alfred and Diana Zike, natives of Albania, to evangelize among the half-million Albanians in and around Athens, Greece. The Zike's are twenty years in the church, have lived in Greece before, know the Greek language, and are proven workers.

Through the years, various elders and mission committee members have visited the works chiefly supported by Germantown. Through his preaching and teaching, Dave Phillips, still Germantown's preacher, routinely reminds the church of its responsibility and joy in making disciples at home and abroad. It is a satisfying thing to be doing what a church knows God wants His people to do. **MM**



# SENDING & SUPPORTING *Mission Work*

When I began preaching 56 years ago, churches of Christ had a global missionary goal of "Into All the World By the Year 2000." We have surpassed that date by 24 years, and although there has been significant progress, we have fallen way short of reaching that goal, and it gets more difficult to achieve every year. We must take local and global missions more seriously than ever before if we are going to carry out Jesus's great commission charge: "Into all the World" (Mark 16:15). Sharing the Gospel through worldwide

missions demands that we be more urgent than ever before about "sending" missionaries to share the Gospel to lost humanity and more sacrificial about adequately "supporting" them financially as they deserve.

In John's account of the Great Commission, Jesus commanded, "As the Father has sent me,

even so I am sending you" (John 20:21).

The greatest "Great Commission" in history was when God sent His Son to be the Savior of the world. In Gethsemane Garden on the night before He suffered the cross, He prayed, "I glorified you on earth, having accomplished the work that you gave me to do" (John 17:4). And after six long hours of crucifixion, some of His last words were, "It is finished" (John 19:30).

But Jesus didn't just complete a Great Commission for Himself, He commanded a Great Commission for His church. He was not making a great suggestion, offering a great opinion, or giving us a great option, although, it has been a great omission! Sending is critical to carrying out the Great Commission.

One of the greatest missionaries of the first-century church of Christ was Paul, the apostle. When he was giving a defense of his missionary work before King Agrippa, he told him that Jesus had charged him, "I am sending you to open their eyes, so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among

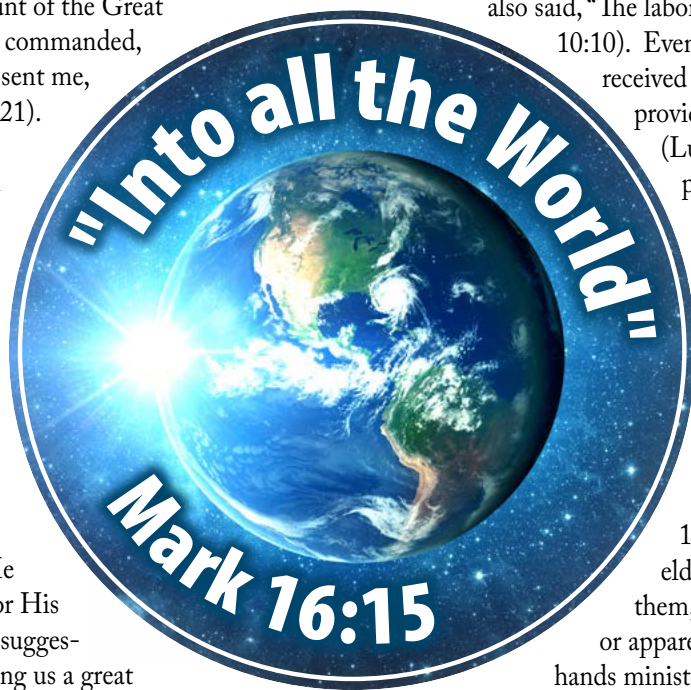
those who are sanctified by faith in me" (Acts 26:17-18). In Romans 10:14, Paul asked three critical questions, "And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching? And how are they to preach unless they be sent?" His answer was a citation from Isaiah 52:7 which exclaimed, "How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the good news!" We not only need more Christians who are willing to be "sent" on short and long-term foreign missions, but we need more local churches to "send" them!

"Sending" out missionaries requires in most cases "supporting." When Jesus sent out His apostles on the limited commission to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, he said, "You received without paying; give without pay" (Matthew 10:8). Jesus sent them out as "givers," not "getters," and was in essence telling them to be willing to share the good news whether they were paid or not. But He also said, "The laborer deserves his food" (Matthew

10:10). Even Jesus Himself and His disciples received support from several women "Who provided for them out of their means" (Luke 8:3). It was Paul's general practice to refrain from his right of salary for his missionary work because he never wanted to be a financial burden to the brethren or accused of preaching for personal profit (cf. 1 Corinthians 9:6, 18). In order to support himself as a missionary in Corinth, he worked nights at tent making and taught the Gospel during the day (Acts 18:1-3). He reminded the Ephesian elders that while a missionary with them, "I coveted no one's silver or gold or apparel. You yourselves know that these hands ministered to my necessities, and to those

who were with me. In all things I have shown you that

by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus who Himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive'" (Acts 20:33-35). I commend all missionaries today, foreign and domestic, who are working tirelessly throughout the world, supporting themselves often from their own financial resources, or are wanting and willing to be bi-vocational. Without their selfless sacrifice of supporting themselves, we would





be falling far more behind in world missions.

Of course, Paul was not opposed to receiving monetary support from the churches that sent him on his missionary journeys. For example, the church at Philippi had done so on more than one occasion. He wrote, "You Philippians yourselves know that in the beginning of the Gospel when I left Macedonia, no church entered into a partnership with me in giving and receiving, except you only. Even in Thessalonica, you sent me help for my needs once and again" (Philippians 4:14-16). Paul defended the church's duty to pay those whom they send out to preach the Gospel, telling the Corinthian church that it was written for our sake in the Law of Moses, and he cites Deuteronomy 25:4 as authority to do so, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it treads out the grain" (cf. 1 Timothy 5:17). It was written for our sake because the plowman should plow in hope and the thresher thresh in hope of sharing in the crop. If we have sown spiritual things among you, is it too much if we reap material things from you? If others share this rightful claim on you, do not we even more?" (1 Corinthians 9:8-12). And then he adds, "the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the Gospel" (1 Corinthians 9:14). Paul's primary point is, "One who is taught the word must share all

good things with the one who teaches" (Galatians 6:6).

When it comes to financial support by churches for missionaries that are sent out, a sad reality is most local preachers receive far more generous salaries compared to missionaries and are given many more benefits. Few missionaries are given even annual standard of living increases, much less meritorious raises. It is a fact that the total amount of money most churches generally budget monthly for missions is extremely small compared to all other expenses.

Sending and supporting missionaries has never been more critical and urgent for several reasons: (1) The world population stands at 8.1 billion people and is growing every day at the rate of 4.3 births per second; (2) The world death rate is 2 per second; (3) The number of missionaries sent locally and globally is decreasing every year through death, retirement, and resignation, and fewer are heeding the call to replace them; (4) More importantly, the second coming of Christ could be any day now to bring every living, lost person into Judgment. It is my prayer that this article will not be taken as a negative evaluation of the Lord's church regarding sending and supporting missionaries, but a positive encouragement to do more and better than we have done in the past. **MM**

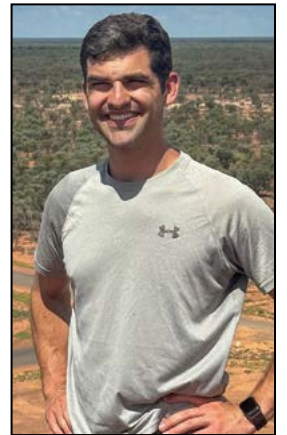


Mersey Bluff church Australia.

in the work immediately, and from there doors began to open, and now on August the 8th, Lord willing, I will take a one-way trip to Tasmania and begin to work with Brett down under.

It is a very encouraging work and the potential is exciting. I was able to visit there at the beginning of this year and work for about a month, and I was greatly encouraged by what I saw. Brett has done a tremendous work, along with others, at the Mersey Bluff congregation. It is a lively, vibrant, and growing congregation! The brethren I met there, along with the brethren I met from all over the country, probably did more to encourage me than I did to them. They are some of the kindest, most sincere, and hard-working brethren I have ever come across. The work at World Evangelism has continued since its start in 1962 with JC & Betty Choate (overseen by the Liberty church of Christ in Dennis, MS). The Choates saw a need for literature in the USA and foreign countries, not only for the edification of brethren, but for outreach to the lost. Thus, the printing of Bible study books, tracts, and *The Voice of Truth International* quarterly magazine began and have continued to be distributed all over the world.

Through the years, others have come along to volunteer with the work: Wayne & Janet Barrier (overseen by Double Springs church of Christ, AL); Louis & Martha Rushmore (Siwell Rd church of Christ, MS) – Louis is the editor for *The Voice of Truth International*; Jerry & Paula Bates (Strickland church of Christ, MS); Shane & Emily Fisher (Springer church of Christ, TN).

The Gospel has been taken to many countries around the world through radio, TV, Internet, massive distribution of literature, Bible schools, and campaigns abroad. *The Voice of Truth International* is the prominent facet and most recognized part of World Evangelism to American brethren. As of this writing, we are on issue #119. Over 50,000 copies in several languages are printed quarterly. This magazine is translated into three major languages and Braille in India, Nepali in Nepal, and Swahili for distribution in many countries in Africa. English editions go into many countries including the Philippines, Guyana, Nigeria, Ghana, and Zimbabwe. Brethren in these countries, as well as the States, use *The Voice of Truth* in evangelistic efforts and report that it helps greatly in reaching lost souls.

Other material is distributed by the thousands annually. Our little orange book, *The Church of the Bible* by JC Choate is among

the most used of the literature, continuing to be translated into various languages around the world. Recently, over 10,000 copies went into prisons in eight different provinces in Zimbabwe, Africa, and the brethren have reported numerous baptisms as a result. Brethren in northeast India have been using this book, as well as others such as

Funds, made possible by generous brethren here in the States, are sent regularly for the on-going TV/radio programs in India and Africa. These programs have the potential of reaching millions, and brethren provide the local churches' contact information for viewers to reach them in order to get free Bible correspondence courses, Bibles, and other literature.

Throughout the year, team members travel to several countries in southeast Asia, Africa, and South America to edify and encourage

brethren by teaching and providing the resources to help evangelize their countrymen. We thank God for the opportunity and strength to do this work and appreciate all brethren and supporters who pray for the Gospel to continue to go into all the world. **MM**

## Betty Choate



*I was speaking recently at the Huntsville congregation near Winona, Mississippi, when I looked out in the audience and immediately recognized Miss Betty Choate. She came along with her team of workers who had been sending out a large mailing that day.*

*Most missionaries, and all of Mississippi, know of the work of J.C. and Betty Choate. Over five decades she and J.C. helped establish churches in Pakistan and Sri Lanka, just off the southern tip of India. What better person could we honor in this special "World Mission" issue than Miss Betty Choate. We are proud to put this worthy woman "In the Spotlight." -dd*

Betty Choate! What can I say? She's one of a kind. When we first met in the late 1970's J.C. was holding a Gospel meeting at the Pine Hill congregation, near our house. She always accompanied him wherever he went to preach or report on the work. She and J.C. stayed with us that week and helped to encourage us to do mission work by sitting for hours discussing the work and how we might be involved. I had always wanted to do mission work, but didn't know where to begin. Later, we traveled to their home in Winona, Mississippi, where we discussed plans to begin our work. Her amazing home was filled with relics of faraway places. My children and I couldn't believe the many carved, wooden elephants, strange looking objects sitting everywhere, thousands of books, a life sized mannequin of a woman in a Muslim burka, which scared the children, but intrigued them too. It was so exciting to see all of these things and made us all want to go where she had gone.

She would host a yearly gathering of missionaries for those who were interested in mission work. She prepared fabulous meals for everyone. The women would spend hours around the large kitchen table, sitting on stools, talking, learning to make chicken curry, and basmati rice, dhal, and of course chapatti. About 20 of us would then sit around a huge dining table, eat, and talk for hours. Her desserts were wonderful as well, especially the fruit pizza, cakes, or the freshly cut mangoes. She would take the women into another room and show us how to wrap a sari out of the many yards of silk she brought back from India and then we would show the men how we looked dressed as Indian women.

Several times she would prepare food for an entire congregation for those interested in mission work. She also fed the congregation when we were visiting with them in New Delhi. When in the states, she speaks to many ladies groups and everyone is amazed at her messages.

She was instrumental in the hosting of about 30 missionaries who met each month for 2 years in the World Evangelism Building in Winona, when we were planning the curriculum for World Evangelism School of Missions. The school classes are now used by the Heritage Christian University Missions Training Center that meets 6 times a year, where our son Joey Barrier is the director. Betty's "First Steps in Faith" is the first book he suggests that people read at the beginning of the school. She attends several times a year to hopefully find that one person who is really interested in mission work, hoping to inspire them to get involved.

The lessons learned from Betty over the years have been invaluable. **MM**

# GROWING PHYSICALLY & SPIRITUALLY WITH *The Manna Project*

"It's a horrible thing when a man must stop preaching the Gospel. Yet, that's the case for many preachers overseas. The congregations are small and can't pay their wages. Then American support dries up. Now that man drives a taxi in town and the village is without a preacher or in some cases a church. Preachers and their families need to eat and have an income to survive. How do we fix this problem?"

That's where the Manna Project begins. Since 2010 they have been solving these issues around the world. They combine sound Biblical teaching with solid agriculture instruction to produce self-sufficient Christians. "Preachers in Africa shouldn't have to have American support to work for the Lord" says Gage Coldwater, founder and Director. Gage started the work in 2010 after teaching a class in Nepal. "The students would approach me daily saying their families were starving. I told them that was something I could help with."

"We have a great team of tireless workers that make all this possible. Justin Hopkins oversees our academics and the work in Tanzania while Gregg Knight oversees the work in Uganda. Josh Robinson works on all our media and travels the country giving reports on our efforts. Because of our experience, all of us regularly teach, preach, and farm as we travel overseas". Gage explains that each member of the project is a preacher and has a background in agriculture. They also each have special talents that enable the Manna Project to succeed where others sometimes struggle.

"We want to strengthen the brethren overseas, both physically and spiritually. We have preaching schools and resource centers to teach preachers and Christians how to produce the food they need to live." Gage goes on to state that, "From a Bible perspective, our preaching schools are full two-year programs modeled after a modified MSOP curriculum. Since 2010 we have trained dozens of men in Africa to preach, teach, and farm." Gage says the success

of the Bible programs is in keeping things native. "We have bush schools where we train street preachers. This means we keep our campus and curriculum focused on being as native and practical as possible. We never want to provide an environment or conditions that these students are unable to replicate when they return to their villages."

The Manna Project is in the process of expanding. In the past couple of years, they have added Resource Centers in Nepal and Kenya. They are also looking to begin work in Central America in

the near future. Gage talks about the importance of training Christians, not just preachers. "At our Resource Centers we offer short courses year-round to provide Christian growth and development. We want brethren to gain knowledge in Church leadership, how to handle issues and combat false doctrine and denominationalism. We also want to give them the tools they need to teach their neighbors." The Manna Project provides Bible classes, agriculture, and vocational training at their schools and Resource Centers.

"We are really blessed to have the opportunity to work with such great folks overseas and to have

an eldership here that encourages our growth." The Manna Project is overseen by the eldership at the Forest Hill church of Christ where Gage and his family attend. He also teaches mission classes at the Memphis School of Preaching. While based stateside, the members of the Manna Project travel around the world every few months to check on and maintain the works overseas. # THE CHURCH IN ROME

"To all the beloved of God in Rome, called as saints; Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 1:7).

During the early years of the New Testament church, the city of Rome was the center of the universe. Residents of Rome were in attendance during the day of Pentecost and most likely were among the some 3,000 who were baptized on that momentous occasion (Acts 2:10). Members of the church in Rome included close friends of Paul, Prisca and Aquila, as well as a long list of other members, several of whom were well known among the Apostles (Romans 16:3-15).

Now, two-thousand years later, what is the state of the church today in this ancient city?

In 2017, my dear friend, Steve Watson, and I spent five days in Rome during a trip to celebrate our fifty years of friendship. We would continue that trip to visit the ruins of Ephesus. One of the highlights of our days in Rome was to worship on the Lord's Day with a nearby congregation.

While the congregation was small, about 50-60 in attendance that morning, it was a joy to be worshipping with the church in this city some two thousand years after it was first established. The preacher that day was also one of the elders of the congregation.

He spoke in Italian, but his PowerPoint slides were also done in English, so it was possible to follow his general points. In the early church they did not have PowerPoint, but they did have the helpful spiritual gift of interpreting.

It was a joy for me to be asked to lead prayer during that service, and to partake of the Lord's Supper in the city where so many Christians gave their lives for their faith. We were told that there was also another congregation in different part of the city.

It was to the church in Rome that Paul pinned these familiar words, "Salute one another with holy kiss. All the churches of Christ greet you" (Romans 16:16). While small in a city of six million, the church Paul longed to visit, and in the city where he gave his life, is still there! **MM**

# A Song for Harding School of Theology

## AS WE BID FAREWELL TO THE MEMPHIS CAMPUS

Harding School of Theology's campus rang with hymn harmony on June 13, 2024, as friends, faculty, and students joined the last chapel service to be held on its Memphis, Tennessee, campus. The school is relocating to Harding University's Searcy, Arkansas, campus in August. Dr. Leon Sanderson, who holds two degrees from the school, led a series of songs including "Be Not Dismayed Whate're Betide," "The Precious Book Divine," and "Doxology". The chapel's wood, plaster, and high ceiling provide ideal acoustics for a cappella singing.

The final chapel service at Harding School of Theology in Memphis was an occasion to honor its 66-year history in Tennessee and anticipate the school's next chapter. Classrooms and faculty offices are being prepared for fall classes in the Jim Bill McInteer Bible and World Mission Center on Harding University's campus. Space for the school's extensive theological library is being prepared in a separate structure near the classrooms.

Dr. Sanderson concluded the chapel service with Harding School of Theology's alma mater, a song for which he wrote the music many years ago. The alma mater's opening line, "Near the banks of the river," provides the title for a recently published book on the history of the school: *Near the Banks of the River: Celebrating Harding School of Theology in Memphis* is edited by Dr. Mark Powell and Dr. Steve Cloer, with contributions from alumni on the impact of the school in theological education, ministerial leadership, and

missions. Copies of the book are available for purchase on Amazon.com.

Mark Powell is Dean and Professor of Theology at Harding School of Theology. "For 66 years, the mansion chapel has been a space devoted to the worship of God. It was good to see so many alumni and supporters join faculty, staff, and current students

for this special Farewell Chapel. Our prayer is that God will continue to work in and through the school as it transitions to Searcy."

HST graduate, Angela Rusk, commented, "I am thankful to have had the opportunity to meet with colleagues and mentors in the place that God used to profoundly impact our lives and ministries. Chapel was a place where I could almost feel the presence of the great cloud of witnesses of the many who had gone before me. It was a blessing to come together to worship our Lord who remains constant throughout change, who redeems our struggles, and who gives us hope for the future."

Advancement Director Greg Muse will remain in his role for Harding School of Theology

after the move to Searcy. Regarding the transition, he said, "The school's mission remains the same. Harding School of Theology will continue to prepare graduates for Christian service, both locally and around the globe."

## BE NOT WEARY IN DOING WELL

# Work the Fields

"...let us not grow weary of doing good" (Galatians 6:9). I'm thankful for this verse. Obviously, it is a danger that one might grow weary even in doing well or else the injunction would not be in the text. So, we know it might be easy to be weary or wearied in certain areas of doing well. Sometimes, because as we age, it is easy to lose focus. Sometimes the work seems unending. At times we do not see the fruit of our labor. We see our work misunderstood, unappreciated, and misappropriated. Our motives might be questioned. And sometimes we just get tired. Each of these might cause us to be weary.

Over the years of ministry, I have found the prime areas people grow weary in are benevolent help where it never seems to end, and we often feel used and/or lied to. Add to this, Bible class teaching where it seems they asked you to teach a quarter and then locked the door and threw away the key, and that was 20 years ago.

But few, if any, areas of our work in the Kingdom can be as wearying as that of funding, supporting, and aiding in mission work. Let me explain. I know the issues.

1. There are bad missionaries and bad people in mission points. But remember, it is the non-sequitur that gets the headline. We naturally hear about the one who mismanages funds, the one who is lazy, the one who is on the dole. That story gets passed

around and before long what is a handful seems like everyone. You know "dog bites man" does not get any ink but "man bites dog" is front page stuff. More than one congregation, leadership, individual has become jaded and thrown in the towel of feeling good about supporting any work. There are many worthy works out there that need you and your congregation's help.

2. It is easy to become disconnected. A little over 10 years ago I started supporting an impressive young man who I felt would do great work. I met him one time and had him in a class in

Tanzania that I taught. When I began to help with his work, I all but commanded two things in return for that help. First, that he be transparent and if/as he got other help from a financial standpoint, he let me know. And second, that EVERY month he sends me a direct message telling a little about how his month had gone and any news he wanted to share. I did not want to feel like an ATM, and I wanted to stay involved in where I was sending the money the Lord has entrusted to me.

3. There legitimately is no end to the request and need: I believe you could send support every day to a missionary in India, Africa, or the Philippines and never run out of works worthy to encourage. It is wonderful the work being done around the world, and it is likely that the church is growing more rapidly today than at any time in history, BUT it can get wearying trying to determine which to help and which must be passed on.

Into all of this mix God throws in this simple injunction: “And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of

calloused (everyone is a crook, so I will not help anyone). A few things to think about this: Beware of the person who is “too smooth;” Be cautious about EVER sending money to someone who is shady with details about their work; Ask questions; Take your time.

3. While there are some dishonest people in other countries who will deceive and take your money and then not do the work, the fact is just as true in the states. Guard your heart. Do not let getting burned (even multiple times), keep you from supporting others. Remember this is all about the Great Commission (Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24). Souls are at stake. When discouraged remember, souls are at stake.

4. Remember, we all make mistakes. We would do well to give grace. A report was not sent, an innocent mistake was made in accounting, how to handle a difficult situation. The reality is, you may be dealing with a young man, or a new convert on the mission field. And remember, we ALL mess up from time to time.

5. Often a little can go a long way: I have regularly “dipped my toe” into a work before I am ready to go all in on it. Little gifts are significant in any work of God.

6. The wonderful news is that there are so very many who help in God’s good works that our brothers and sisters see to it that MUCH good is done. Never feel like you are alone in this.

7. Known works are wonderful BUT they had to start at zero in order to do the good works that makes them worthwhile. So, while I hope you will support some works you know well, I also hope you will not totally shy away from a work just because it is new, or you do not know as much about it. There are many, many good servants out there.

May God bless you as you encourage good works with the blessing God has given you! If The Jenkins Institute can ever help you in learning more about a work or with an onsite visit to see and encourage a work you are currently involved with, let us know.

Finally: “..the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age, waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, who gave Himself for us to redeem us from all lawlessness and to purify for Himself a people for His own possession who are zealous for good works. Declare these things, exhort and rebuke with all authority.

Let no one disregard you. Remind them to be submissive to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work...” (Titus 2:11-3:1). **MM**

faith” (Galatians 6:9-10).

These thoughts are not LAUNCHED toward anyone or any work but are general observations over time and especially as Jeff and I have visited over 20 countries and multiple works in a few of those places over the last three years.

1. Mission Work can be done without support. Money, by its very nature, has a corrupting influence. The money we give to mission efforts should serve to progress the Gospel. It should support adequately those who are presenting and promoting the Truth of God’s glorious Message. The godly approach is generosity.

2. It is relatively early, and we are all still learning to navigate social media and mission work: The ability to send “friend requests” over social media has increased the opportunity for those who may be dishonest. I am sure I am not the only person who feels that three “communications” with a “brother” from a handful of countries will ask for support of their work. This can cause those who wish to do good to feel either guilt (I should help everyone) or

# I Must be about MY FATHER'S BUSINESS

In Luke 2:41-52, we get a glimpse into the young life of Jesus. At the age of 12, Jesus decides to stay in Jerusalem on their journey home from the Passover feast. After traveling, Mary and Joseph realized that Jesus was not with them. They return to Jerusalem to find Him. When they find Jesus, He is in the temple. Any parent would ask their son the same question: "Why would you scare us like that?" His response in Luke 2:49 is, "I must be about my Father's business." Jesus was expressing His awareness of His unique relationship with God. Referring to God as "my Father" highlights His recognition of His divine sonship. Also, even at a young age, He recognized that His life had a special purpose aligned with God's will.

Young people, for those of us today who are Christians, we should be saying that we are "to be about our Father's business." But what does it look like? I will be honest with you: when I was a teenager, and I heard someone say we were to be about "our Father's business", I would nod my head yes, but in my heart, I had no clue what they

That is not true when we look at the smaller picture. Now that I am older, I understand better what it means to be about "our father's business." I want you to understand it now, so here are three things I believe we can apply to our lives that show us to be about "our Father's business."

## 1. Consider spiritual growth as being about our Father's business.

We do this by prioritizing time for prayer and studying the Bible regularly to deepen our understanding of God's word. We must actively participate in church services and activities directed to grow the youth groups.

## 2. How about living out the Christian values that we learn?

We show kindness, compassion, and empathy to others, reflecting the love of Christ in our interactions at school, at home,

and in the community. We have integrity and honesty in all situations, even when it's challenging, demonstrating the moral standards taught by Jesus.

## 3. When talking about our Father's business, we make ethical choices.

We are making choices that align with our faith, whether in our relationships, media consumption, or personal habits, seeking to honor God in all areas of life.

So, I am saying that for us to be "about our Father's business" today means integrating our faith into every aspect of our lives, making conscious decisions to follow Jesus's teachings, serving others, and growing in their relationship with God. It involves a commitment to live out Christian values faithfully and courageously in a world that often challenges their faith. We see these challenges more now than we have in a very long time. Being about "our Father's business" requires us to wake up each day with the mindset we are doing the Lord's work. May God bless you as you navigate life doing his work. **MM**

We began 25 years ago working with Erastus Kavuti who said, "We want to be known as the church that cares." We have drilled water wells, taught people how to improve their food production with composting, raised planting beds, and drip



irrigation, provided medical supplies, and sponsored the secondary school education of aids, orphans, and students from poor families. While we have provided food aid at times of famine, our goals are long term to equip and empower the people in the name of Jesus Christ. Following Jesus's instructions in Matthew 25, we have sought to meet physical needs as a way of creating opportunities to meet spiritual needs. To date we have trained 12 preachers, educated 450 students, taught survival gardening to 600 farmers, provided medical supplies to two hospitals and two medical clinics, and drilled 10 water wells in partnership with Healing Hands International, and Rotary Clubs.

Caring for Kenya Director, Carl Burkybile, works with board



members to arrange an annual mission trip to Kenya. As we meet with Kenyan leaders, we listen, teach, and plan for the future. As described in Philippians 1:3-6 we consider ourselves as partners in the Gospel with the Kenyans as we strive to bring people to Christ. **MM**

# Precious Memories



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## by Dennis Doughty "INSCRIPTIONS" Our Worldwide Challenge

When Jesus said "Go into all the World and preach the Gospel," it was an amazing challenge to his 12 Apostles, who had no missionary or preaching experience. Having gone around the world on several mission trips, I can say that world evangelism remains a difficult challenge. International travel today, especially to some parts of the country, is stressful and can be dangerous. The constant security checks, the long lines and packed airplanes and delays wear upon one physically and mentally. Add to this language, culture barriers, and fund raising, you have a real task on your hands.

But it is nothing compared to what the Apostle Paul faced. He was beaten more times than he could remember and stoned once. Three times the ship he was on sank. He was thrown into prison several times. He faced many dangers on the roads he traveled. He went without food and water for days and endured many a sleepless night. He faced fierce opposition to his teachings from Jews and Gentiles alike (2 Corinthians 12:23-29).

But he, and his dedicated group of followers, got the job done. They spread the Gospel, establishing congregations in every major city of the known world. Paul said the Gospel had come to Colosse "just as in all the world" (Colossians 1:6). Today the work lives on, and our worldwide challenge continues.

## "Into all the World"

Jesus gave His disciples the challenge to "Go into all the world and preach the gospel" (Mark. 16:15). After the Day of Pentecost, the gospel message spread like wildfire across "Jerusalem, Judea, and Samaria, even to the remotest part of the earth" (Acts 1:8). As the 12 Apostles spread out, and the early Christians "went everywhere preaching the word" (Acts 8:4), it wasn't long before Christ's message of Salvation had "turned the world upside down" (Acts. 17:6).

Thirty years after Jesus gave His Great Commission, the Apostle Paul wrote to the Colossians and stated that the gospel had come to "all the world, also it is constantly bearing fruit and increasing." He went on to say that the Gospel which they had heard, "was proclaimed in all creation under heaven" (Colossians 1:6, 23).

With no mass media, with no planes or trains, and under resistance and persecution, they changed the world. They never wavered, never became discouraged, and never gave up. They lived for, and died for, their faith in Jesus and His resurrection. I can say that post-World War 2, the Lord's church again spread the gospel across the world, from India, Singapore, and Korea, from Canada, Mexico, and yes, even in America, the Gospel message is "bearing fruit and increasing." **MM**

# Paul's Missionary Journeys

*The Apostle Paul's missionary journeys took place over several years and covered regions along the Mediterranean Sea. His goal was to "win obedience from the Gentiles" and bring them to "the obedience of faith". Paul's journeys are described in Acts 13–20, and here's an outline of his three main journeys:*

### 1st Journey:

(Acts 13–14) Paul and Barnabas were called by the Holy Spirit to spread the Gospel, and they traveled to Cyprus, Antioch in Pisidia, Iconium, Lystra, and Derbe. They preached in synagogues about Jesus Christ as the fulfillment of Old Testament promises.

### 2nd Journey

(Acts 15:36–18:22) Paul's travels took him to Phrygia, Galatia, Macedonia, Thessalonica, Berea, Athens, Corinth, Ephesus, and Caesarea. (Acts 18:23–21:14) Paul traveled to Ephesus, Macedonia, Greece, and Troas before returning to Asia Minor.
